While the awards took the novel form of a masquerade ball at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre, the cream of Queensland's ICT and biotechnology industries were there to unmask in style the nine award winners.

The winners, which are now in the running for the supreme award, are Wealthfarm (Emerging Business), Carestaff Nursing Services (Family Business), Austmarine (Manufacturing

The winners were announced at the atmospheric Quid Bar in Conrad

Jupiters, Broadbeach, on September 24. GCBEA vice-president Richard Holt praised the calibre and diversity of the September winners. Awards event co-ordinator Lisa Maddison said the October entries had also exceeded all previous years.

Mr Holt encouraged the support of the new Mayor's corporate social responsibility award.

"We will be looking at the everyday practices of businesses in assisting not-for-profit local community organisations, particularly their mentoring assistance and provision of staff time," Mr Holt said.

The first winner of this award will be announced at the GCBEA gala event at Conrad Jupiters on November 22, 2008. The winning business will receive \$5000 to be passed on to their community partner.

Entries for this year's awards have now closed and early entries are encouraged next year. The first entries will be accepted on May 1, 2009.
